Artisan Bakery Brings Bagels and Blessings



hen things in my life get stressful, I bake," says Sheila Allison ('84). "I believe God has brought me back to it repeatedly." Sheila's sourdough starter and her openness to God's leading have taken her on a journey with many unexpected turns, but when times got tough for UCA this spring, it was clear she was in the right place at the right time.

Sheila joined the staff at UCA as the cafeteria director last fall, and before long, she won everyone's hearts with her sweet

spirit. In addition, she is appreciated for her competent management of the kitchen, as well as the delicious meals she and her team serve each day. Quiet and

hard-working, Sheila is also fun-loving and creative. She and her husband, Dennis, have two grown children, Kelsey and Sidney.

Baking is not a new interest for Sheila. "It's this thing with me—I can't stop baking." It was while working at Enterprise Academy in Kansas 20 years ago that she decided to try baking with wild yeast. So she did her research and grew her first sourdough starter. To begin with, family and friends were the only ones to enjoy the results of her experiments. But before too long, word spread, and she began taking orders from others in the community each week. "I had a feeling this skill would come in handy someday, for something," she says. And she was right—everywhere the family moved, it didn't take long before she was baking again.

The sourdough starter she grew in

Kansas survived throughout the years, miraculously even through a car accident! When their children were approaching their teenage years,

Sheila and Dennis wanted to give them an opportunity to learn the value of work, so together, their family opened The Baker's Stone in Republic, Washington. During the next six years, this successful bakery provided many hours of hands-on experience for their own children and a number of their friends, as well.





When things in my life get stressful, I bake," says Sheila Allison ('84). "I believe God has brought me back to it repeatedly. One of the first things Sheila did when she arrived at UCA was bake bagels for the staff pre-session meetings. "They were the best bagels I had ever tasted," said Principal Eric Johnson. "I was blown away when I discovered that they were baked fresh that morning in our own cafeteria!" Sheila's sourdough bread, bagels, cinnamon rolls, and dinner rolls started appearing on the weekly menu, and were an instant hit.

In January of this year, Sheila mentioned the idea of starting a bakery at UCA to administrators. They talked through some of the possibilities, but the time just didn't seem right to move forward. However, several months later, when it became necessary for UCA to transition to distance learning because of coronavirus concerns, she felt a strong impression that she would be baking again soon. She was not even the least bit surprised when Eric asked her to begin baking in the now empty cafeteria.

Since the dorms were closed, the girls' deans volunteered to help, and several other staff members also stepped forward. To start with, an email went to staff, informing them that baked goods would be available. The response was very positive, and in the next couple of weeks, items were offered to the community. To say that the bakery was a success would be an understatement. By the time the school year ended, orders were pouring in each week for hundreds of sourdough loaves, as well as dozens of cinnamon rolls and, of course, the beloved bagels. Other popular items were focaccia bread and dinner rolls.

The success of the bakery was truly a blessing to all who were involved. It not only provided a job for some of the support staff whose responsibilities drastically changed when the students left, but it was a financial blessing to the school, as well. And it was definitely something positive for everyone to look forward to each week during the "stay home, stay healthy" orders. Laura Pierce, who teaches Dual Credit History at UCA, says it was always a fight at her house for the last cheddar jalapeno bagel. "We loved everything we tried from the bakery! The bagels were definitely our family favorites, however. On bakery pick-up days, I barely made it through the door before someone would grab the bags of fresh bagels. All of the flavors of those chewy treats are so delicious."

Sheila has especially appreciated the opportunities she has had to interact with people through baking. "I keep in contact with many of my former employees and customers, and I'm thankful for the relationships I've developed and the chances I've had to share my faith," she says. "The last several months have been an awesome time to form strong connections with some of my fellow staff members, too." Already, there are several students who have expressed interest in baking next school year, and Sheila is looking forward to mentoring them and sharing her expertise.

God's timing in leading Sheila and her family to UCA is amazing! And who knew that bagels could be such a blessing? "We don't yet know the exact future of the bakery at UCA, but I am excited to see what God has planned," says Sheila. The bakery is closed for the summer, but beginning in September, baked goods will be sold through the farm stand at UCA. Weekly ordering will again be available to the local community as soon as possible after school starts.

Alumni Team Meets Challenge

You never know what a day will bring, and this is especially true as the COVID-19 crisis continues to unfold. For alumnus Jeremy McCombs ('95) and Andrew McCrary ('87), events took an unusual turn when they were tasked with storing and managing shipments of over 10 million pieces of personal protective equipment that arrived in Spokane in early April.

Andrew is currently serving as the Director of Trust Services for the Upper Columbia Corporation, and Jeremy is the Church Ministries and Discipleship Director for the Upper Columbia Conference. The two men were joined by Joe Urbin, a local computer and communications expert and the father of two UCA alumni, who donated vacation time to volunteer at the warehouse. Between the three of them, they managed shipments, processed orders, and packaged and helped distribute supplies to area organizations.

"This was a tremendous opportunity to interface with community leaders and other volunteers," says McCombs. "I found the part I enjoyed the most was relating to the people I came in contact with." He also admits that brushing up on his forklift driving skills from college days was a lot of fun. "It was a little like riding a bike—I was able to remember how to drive it and I never spilled a pallet."

The story actually began over 12 years ago when Patty Marsh (UCA Registrar from 1994-2000) took over the leadership of the Adventist Community Services for the Upper Columbia Conference. Patty started working right away to form relationships with leaders in the Spokane community and to recruit a team of disaster response volunteers. ACS specializes in warehouse management, and Patty's team is highly trained with specialized software and management practices.

As concern over the virus continued to grow, state and local organizations began donating needed supplies to be used for area hospitals, clinics, police and fire departments. Shipments of masks, gloves, gowns, hand sanitizer, and other items began to come in and a secure storage area was needed, as well as volunteers to manage and distribute the supplies.

Patty and her team were ready and willing, but there was one problem. Most of the available trained volunteers were retirees, which means they were at heightened risk from the virus and were mandated to "stay home and stay safe." "People were needed that could step in quickly," states Patty. "We were looking for volunteers that had solid computer skills and could quickly learn the warehouse management software." This is where McCombs, McCrary, and Urbin came in. When contacted about the need, all three men were ready and willing to help.

"It was an honor to be able to serve my community in this way," states McCrary. "It was a great opportunity to raise awareness about my church and what we stand for. Patty has done an awesome job of connecting with the community in preparation for disasters, and it was great to see how all the various organizations came together in response to this crisis."

Though the supplies are now being managed and distributed by other area organizations, Patty continues to receive positive comments and thanks from community officials for the way ACS stepped up and served during the worst of the crisis. We are proud of our UCA family and thankful for the countless ways they continue to live out the values we are working to instill in young people—service and love for others.





Farm Grows at UCA

ver the past three years, those of you who live nearby might have noticed a small farm beginning to take shape on campus. Beginning with our greenhouse in 2017, the farm has grown to encompass a shipping container that has been converted to a growing environment, along with a small you-pick garden beginning to grow to the west of the greenhouse. As part of our project-based learning environment at UCA, students in the Home Renovation class, taught by Jesse Melendy, also designed and constructed a produce stand which will eventually be open for selling produce to the public.

This spring, Bryce Reading took over the management

of the farm and, along with Ted McConnachie ('82), began the transition from hydroponics to soil in the greenhouse. The decision to change the growing method stemmed from a desire to teach students how to grow things in the ground instead of hydroponically. Reading is excited to help students understand best practices in agriculture, and soil based gardening is more readily achievable for most people. When school starts, Reading plans to employ at least five students to help around the farm.

In March, after our students started distance learning, several staff members expressed interest in contributing to the growth of the farm. Ted McConnachie built all of the raised beds inside the greenhouse. Curtis Anderson, UCA's choral director, has a passion for growing flowers. He designed and built the beautiful flowerbed surrounding the farm sign in front of the greenhouse. Jesse Melendy, industrial arts teacher, took the lead in finishing the produce stand. Rob Knipple, UCA's band director, pitched in wherever he was needed. Their combined efforts are noticeable to everyone who drives by.

Throughout this summer, Reading and his team of student workers have managed the planting, weeding, and watering in the greenhouse and the outdoor garden area. Caring for the growing plants is no easy task, as many different types of fruits and vegetables are being cultivated in and around the greenhouse. In the U-pick patch, rows of tomatoes, raspberries, and pumpkins have been planted. Inside the greenhouse, many more vegetables can be seen growing, including lettuce, carrots, tomatoes, beets, cucumbers, kale, melon, parsley, beans, radishes, potatoes, peppers, a variety of herbs, and even some giant marigolds.

In the months to come, as the fruits and vegetables are ready to be harvested, plans for selling them to the public are underway. Currently, the beginning harvests of lettuce, cucumbers, tomatoes, and beets are being purchased and enjoyed by the staff. As fall approaches, produce will be available for purchase from the farm stand, along with items from the UCA Bakery. "It's a matter of trial and error, and learning what grows best in the greenhouse," says Reading. "I look forward to working with our students to continue building the farm program." Reading hopes to add some cherry trees to the U-pick patch, and also expand the outdoor garden area.

UCA Receives Wellness Center Grant

Statistics indicate 50% of students

will struggle with mental health

issues during adolescence

CA was blessed during the past year to receive a grant for \$130,000 to transform the Olin Peach Power House into a Wellness Center. The goal of the Wellness Center is to provide accessible and affordable mental health services to our students without the need to transport them off campus. Part of the grant has been designated to provide counseling scholarships to uninsured or underinsured students. Plans have already been drawn up and bids secured,

and as soon as the contractors are available, the renovation will begin. "This is going to be such a positive change, because it will free up a lot of resources, especially in the dorms," says Dani Rivera, the head girls' dean. The time and

expense previously used for transportation will be reallocated to other important needs, and students will be able to get to and from their appointments quickly, minimizing missed classes and work appointments.

Michelle Melendy, currently the school counselor, will serve as the clinical director for the center. "Statistics indicate 50% of students will struggle with mental health issues during adolescence," states Melendy, citing a study published in the National Institute of Mental Health. "We are thrilled to have this opportunity to meet that growing need." In addition to providing counseling, the center will also offer college and career guidance free to all students.

Plans for the space include three individual counseling rooms and a telehealth space where students can connect with off-site counselors. There will also be a gathering area to be used for group therapy sessions, and it will be supervised during much of the day for

> students who need a quiet place to engage in relaxing activities such as coloring.

> Stephanie Gladding will serve as the Program Director, providing mental health screening and information, facilitating

communication with parents, and making referrals for mental health concerns. The UCA Church pastor will also maintain an office in the power house, underscoring the connection between spiritual and emotional wholeness.
