

Let God build your kingdom. Put aside all your blueprints and all your expectations, hand over your hammer, and let God build your empire. I hear He is a pretty good carpenter.



"Among Us" is set in space, with a crew of 4-10 players. Each player is given one of two positions,

either a crewmate or an impostor. Like the game "Mafia", each player is working to find who the impostors are. At the same time, the ship is being sabotaged and crewmates are being picked off one by one. Every time a crewmate has been reported dead, the players vote on who they believe the impostor to




THE BEST FIVE INDIE ALBUMS OF 2020


