It is finally fall, and it is time to get down to some cozy fireside feeling and pumpkin-spicy things!

Fall Mug Cake

- 1/4 cup all-purpose flour
- 2 tbsp brown sugar
- 1/4 tsp baking powder
- 1/4 tsp cinnamon
- 1/2 tsp vanilla extract
- 1/4 cup milk
- 1 1/2 tbsp butter, melted
- Crumb Topping
- 1 tbsp butter, softened
- 2 tbsp brown sugar
- 1 tbsp flour
- 1/4 tsp cinnamon

Throw all the mug cake ingredients into a microwave safe mug. (You might want to melt the butter first in the microwave.) Throw together the crumb topping in a small bowl and sprinkle it on the batter in the mug. Then microwave for about one minute, depending on the power of your microwave. Test if it is cooked by sticking a toothpick inside. If there is no raw batter on it, your mug cake is ready to enjoy!
