
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ASB'S Spring Party



At the dawn of April, students in the Marine Biology class boarded buses and drove to Rosario Beach, located north of Seattle near Deception Pass. On the trip, students got to see different marine life in person. Following their arrival, students took pictures of the gorgeous sunset, then had dinner and went to bed. The next day started off with personal journaling, followed by classes on various topics within marine biology, such as plankton and seaweed.

The next day, the group took a ferry to the San Juan Islands, where they visited the iconic Whale Museum. After, they went to the Lime Kiln Point Lighthouse, where a hydrophone listens for nearby Orca Whale pods. The rest of the day was spent exploring Friday Harbor and other islands.

The final day, on the way back home, the group visited the Seattle Aquarium, which has an impressive set of marine animals. They are one of the few aquariums that has a Giant Pacific Octopus. The aquarium also has multiple petting areas, where people can feel sea urchins and sea anemones. They, additionally, have many exhibits of larger animals, like seals and otters.

Sophomore, Josie Littler, who went on the trip says, "I had lots of fun on the Marine Bio Trip. We stayed in little cabins, ate amazing food cooked by Mr. C, studied the ocean, looked at plankton, and we even dissected a squid. China is Shrinking

Since the 1950's, China has had the largest population in the world. Because of the enforced policy that only allowed one child for each family, the population is shrinking. This policy lasted 35 years, from 1980 to 2016. If a woman were found with more than one child, she would either be forced to have an abortion, pay an extreme fee to keep them, or risk other consequences from hiding them. Women would have several abortions in their life, sometimes even four.

This created a larger elderly population and fewer young people to fill their positions and take care of them. This increased the cost of labor due to the smaller workforce. Because of all these issues, the number of children per couple was raised to two around 2016 and eventually to three in 2021. Currently, people are very reluctant to have more than one child because they do not have the financial ability to raise them.

An American Taken by Russia

Evan Gershkovich, a journalist for the Wall Street Journal, was recently taken by Russia's FSB (Federal Security Service). Gershkovich was accused of espionage, which is the act of obtaining confidential information. Both the Wall Street Journal and the Biden Administration confidently deny this accusation. He was put in the Lefortovo prison on March 29. Many U.S. government officials have low hopes for the release of Gershkovich because the FSB holds trials in secret that tend to be unfair. There were times that Gershkovich had strange unidentified men follow and film his every movement. Gershkovich spoke about his terrifying

encounters, and he wondered what was to come. Mr. Gershkovich had grown up in a Russian household with both of his parents and grandma having immigrated from Russia. Because of his connection to Russia, he wanted to go back and see where his roots are from. So, about five and a half years before his arrest, he did journalism in Russia. He explored the culture, food, bands, and people. Sometimes he even got tours of where his parents grew up and spent their childhood, helping him connect with his heritage. He fell in love with the country that would later hold him in prison for the next 20 years.


